LIVE WELL PROGRAM AT SWWC




SWWC’s self-funded, member-owned insurance pools provide monies to school districts and city/county/other governmental agencies to facilitate wellbeing activities and biometric screenings for their employees on the health plan.

In 2018-19, \$247,590 was available to School Pool member districts to offer wellbeing activities and biometric screenings for their employees with \$908,500 in incentives being paid to employees on the health plan in those districts.

In 2019, \$154,420 is available to organizations in our CCOGA Insurance pool to offer wellbeing activities and biometric screenings for their employees. In addition, \$1,103,000 worth of incentives is available to employees on the health plan in those CCOGA organizations for their participation in wellbeing activities and a biometric screening.

Each fall, SWWC hosts a Live Well Workshop for organizations interested in participating in SWWC’s Live Well programs.

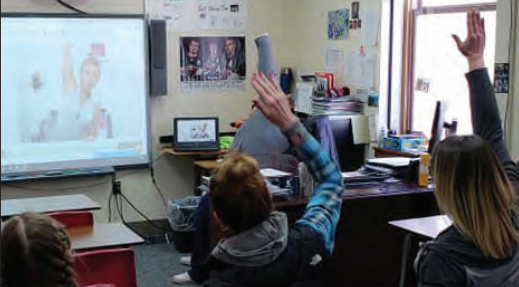

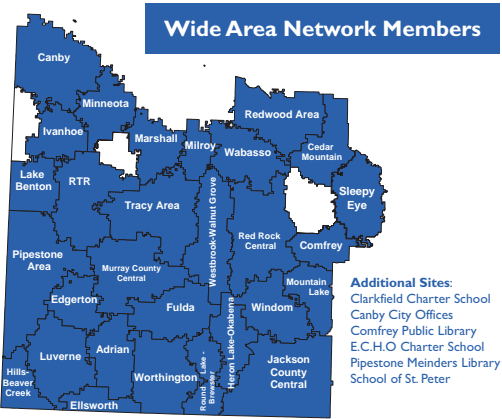

ECSE AT SWWC




INSPIRE ACTION 2.0 is an early childhood special education program self-assessment tool used to identify areas of program strength and program components that, if addressed, would increase overall program quality.

SWWC brought 30 district teams together in December 2018. Teams identified key areas for program improvement, including time for monthly team meetings, high quality curriculum and assessment tools, and increasing child find in their birth-2 population.

SWWC has been analyzing the data. Focus/improvement areas identified include Assessment & Curriculum use and Ongoing Data Collection and Use for both Part C (birth-2) and Part B (3-6). Trainings were held to support district teams in these areas.

WEBINARS were offered during 2018-19 for ECSE providers covering topics such as MDE updates, due process, MARSS, best practice, and more. This proved to be a great way to provide PD without staff leaving districts. An average of 40 attended the live webinars and 36 viewed the recorded webinars. We also held monthly ECSE Newer Teacher webinars due to the significant increase in new ECSE teachers with varying levels of licensure and experience within our region.







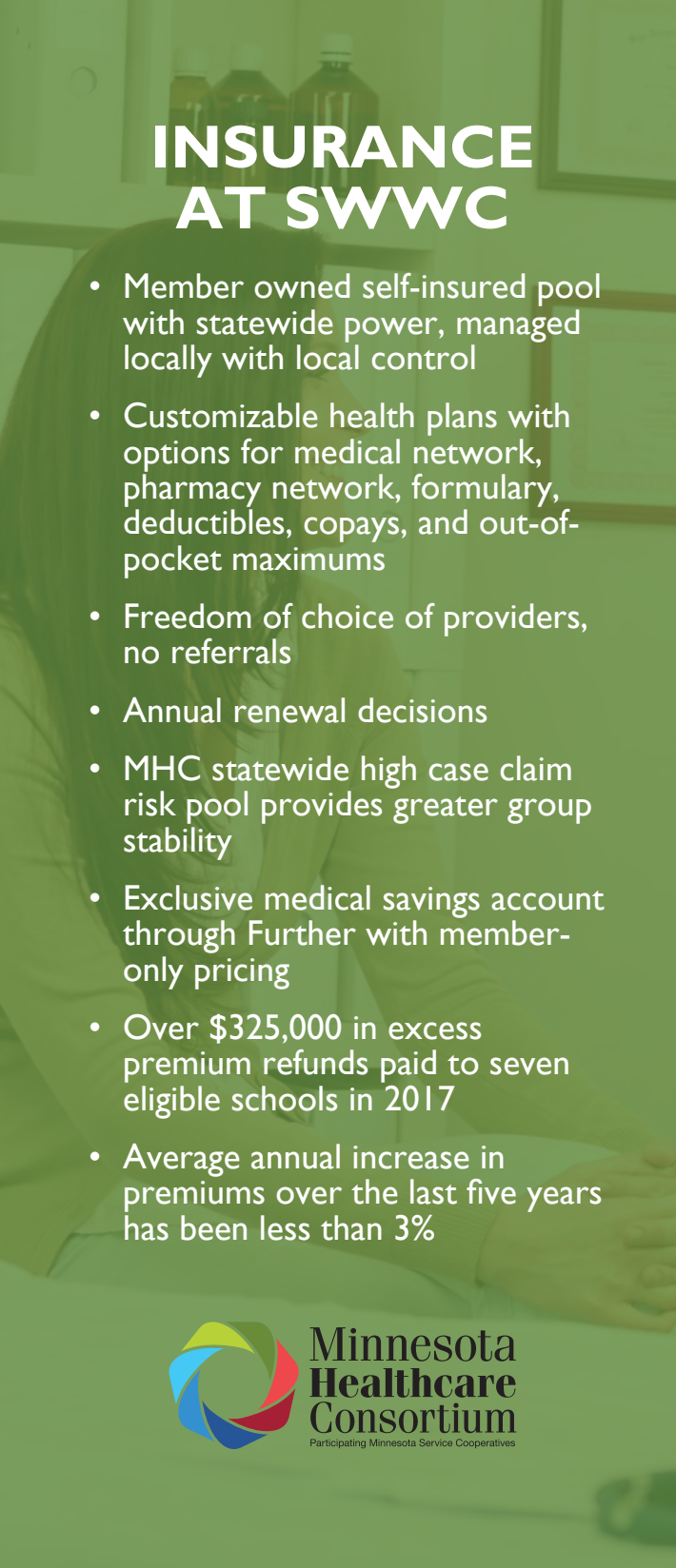

MEMBERSHIP AT SWWC

Members gain access to our educational and administrative programs and services AND receive preferred pricing on professional development offerings.

Full membership is open to public school districts, cities, counties, and other governmental agencies as defined in Minnesota Statute (M.S. 471.59) and are within the SWWC region. Full members pay a one-time \$25 membership fee.

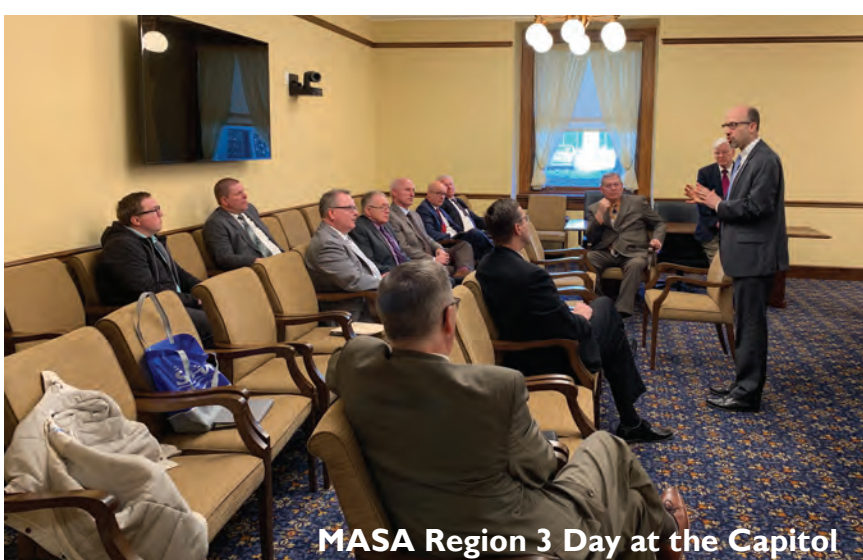

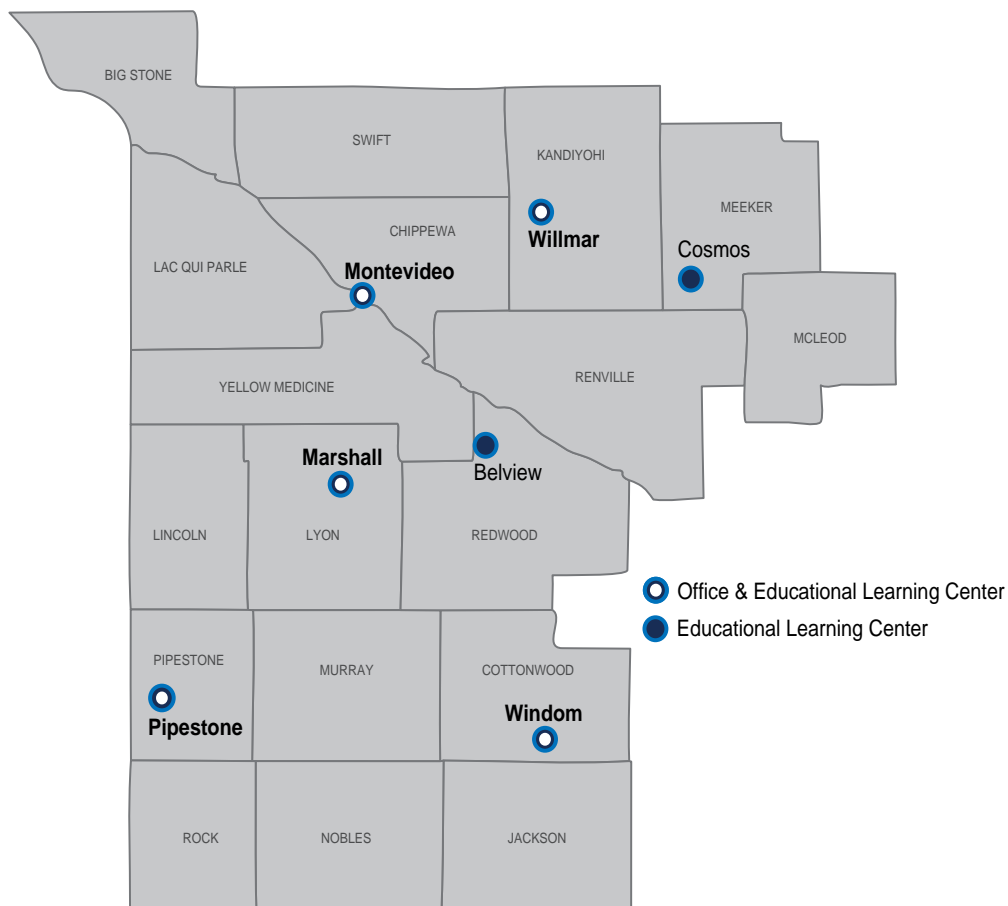
